Mark Bradford, 1961 Art is a language: how do we understand its meaning(s), its intent, and the conversation we, the viewers, have with it? In this new-docent training course, we explore a wide array of Western art. Our course begins about 1850, in the tumult of great social and political changes of Western Europe, and concludes with global artistic trends of the early 21^{st} century. Throughout the course, we always have an eye on the backbone of your future tours as a Modern docent - the Museum's permanent collection.

While we will begin our survey with the familiar media of painting and sculpture, we will also be looking at photography, performance art, earthworks, conceptual art, installation art, and more. This vast amount of material is organized, both in our textbook and in our class, into both chronological and geographical groupings.

We begin by looking at the canonical and traditional European art of the mid-nineteenth century. By the end of this course, we will be engaging in a dialogue with international art that has, in some ways, broken irrevocably with the past. But of course, there are lingering ties. Throughout the course, we see striking and important changes in the role of the artist, as well as in the function of art. Upon graduating from this course, you will possess a solid framework in the history of modern and contemporary art, upon which you will continue to build as a Modern docent.
